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FROM THE PRESIDENT



Right-Mindedness

"Right-mindedness" seems an inartful term – ambiguous, subject to shades of meaning, so flexible it conveys no concrete meaning. But it's the right term to describe an almost palpable common feature I see among our membership, and especially in

those we really get behind, the ones we cheer.

If you recently joined us at the Annual Holiday Party at the Aquarium on December 10th, you saw three examples of right-mindedness: 1) Mayor Joe Riley; 2) Judge Michael Duffy; and 3) each other.

The event was spectacular. Festooned with bright green and silver (the hand of Natalie Bluestein is everywhere), the Aquarium teemed with schools of lawyers, those hundreds in attendance. We came together as we do on occasion to connect with one another and to celebrate our good fortune in being Charleston lawyers. We came together in the dappled light of the fish tanks also to honor some remarkable men. A beautiful night, a successful night, but back now to our three examples in attendance that evening.

Mayor Joe Riley spent the last forty years in public service for the right reasons. There is an earnestness, a personal responsiveness to the clarion call of underserved, public goals. His response has less to do with any personal promotion than with providing a benefit to people who are usually not even in the room. Modest people, forgotten people, important people, but people without his ability to assemble a vision into a reality, one often many years down the road. This particular form of right-mindedness is rare because it takes so many skill sets, any of which alone would be a considerable gift. So one element of right-mindedness is a selfless vision.

If Judge Michael Duffy cannot make you smile, you have personality challenges. Famous for his good sense and wit (and they are both plentiful in him), I don't think either of those is his greatest gifts. His greatest gift is his instinct to treat people well. The Bar loves him because not only is he one of us, a friend, but because he also can be relied upon for an even hand. We're all cocky enough to think that's all we need. Judge Duffy's form of right-mindedness is a willingness to carefully listen, and a good-natured recognition of what's common-sensically fair.

What do these have to do with you, the third example? Let me answer by telling you about Taylor Morris. Taylor is a recent graduate of the Charleston School of Law who serves on the Bar Association's Executive Committee. He attended almost every meeting which could have been interesting to him in only the most abstract way. But Taylor persevered. He interrupted when he needed to. When the topic of a recent Diversity and Inclusion Seminar arose, he followed up on a suggestion we had for the first-time use of the Square device, a payment system which allows us to charge non-CCBA members for registration at the Seminar site, benefitting both our registration numbers and the registrant. Taylor attended, endured, showed up at the Seminar to register attendees and operate the device for us, and in these ways contributed very good help for the common good. Sometimes right-mindedness is about hanging in there and doing practical things in furtherance of an overarching goal.

Like Taylor, you continue your membership with the CCBA. Your attendance and participation in our CLE seminars, Bar-related committees and events, and at our Annual Holiday Event and Annual Meeting make you part of the glue of our organization, a group that shares your innate appreciation of right-mindedness. We need and appreciate your vision, your good judgment, and your contributions in whatever form they may take. Thanks for always making me proud to be a Charleston lawyer.

United States Magistrate Judge for the District of South Carolina, Judge Bristow Marchant

Career: Judge Marchant began his career in 1980 as staff counsel to the U.S. Senate Judiciary Committee. He then worked for the Office of the South Carolina Attorney General in 1982 and 1983. In addition, for a short time in 1983 he was the Assistant Chief Counsel for the S.C. Department of Highways and Public Transportation. From there, Judge Marchant practiced with the firm of Adams, Quackenbush, Herring & Stuart, P.A. until his judicial appointment in 1992.

Family: Wife, Betsy; Sons, Bristow (30) and Madison (28); Daughter, Sallie (26)

- 1. What the bar would be surprised to learn:** Judge Marchant taught Constitutional Law as an adjunct professor at the College of Charleston and served a term on the Richland County Council.
- 2. Personal life away from the bench:** Judge Marchant is an avid reader, and especially enjoys biographies. In addition, he enjoys taking the boat out and fishing in and around the Isle of Palms.
- 3. Best part about being a judge:** "I really enjoy working with the people at the courthouse." In particular, Judge Marchant appreciates working with his clerks and judicial assistant.
- 4. Hardest part about being a judge:** "The workload!" Judge Marchant stated that everyone wants things to move quickly, but with the volume of cases it does not always move as fast as people hope. In addition, Judge Marchant noted that it is difficult to predict how quickly a case might move because you never know when a case might settle or which cases might go to trial.
- 5. In your courtroom, DO:** "Be prepared!" Judge Marchant says that he always reads the briefs presented by parties prior to a hearing, so at oral argument he wants to hear something that he does not already know. Judge Marchant went on to say that if an attorney needs to have someone stand in for them, the covering attorney should know the basic information about the case and file so that the case can continue to move forward.

"If y'all are prepared, I'll be prepared."
- 6. In your courtroom, DON'T:** One of Judge Marchant's pet peeves is when attorneys become argumentative with each other in court. Attorneys should treat each other in a civil manner and should stand when speaking and address the court or a witness instead of opposing counsel.
- 7. Advice to young lawyers:** "Lawyers need to understand that if they want a hearing, they should ask for it." Judge Marchant elaborated stating, "if I read the briefs, and they are well done, I may just issue an order." Judge Marchant also referenced that as a young attorney it is good to focus on a particular area of law because the laws are so complex.
- 8. What experience best prepared you for the bench?** "The wide variety of experience was the best preparation for me." Prior to joining the bench Judge Marchant worked in private practice doing white collar business litigation, but also spent time working with the South Carolina Office of the Attorney General where he was able to prosecute cases. In addition, Judge Marchant noted that his work with the Senate Judiciary Committee and his time on the County Council helped broaden his legal experience.
- 9. What would you change about the American Judicial System?** "I think it works pretty well." However, Judge Marchant also added that because the confirmation process has become so politicized, it has become more difficult for Article 3 judges to be confirmed

Both Jim and Judge Duffy have been champions of Charleston Pro Bono. They have shown through their support of CPB, their recognition that we are fortunate to have a unique and successful model for the delivery of pro bono legal services in Charleston County. Over the past ten years, more than a thousand low income clients have been served by our volunteers. No other County bar association in the Southeastern U.S. has a Pro Bono Program comparable to ours.

These responsibilities will involve heightening the public profile of the Program and ultimately increasing the flow of funding and volunteer services.
